# Lent at TVC



“For this very reason, make every effort to add to your faith goodness; and to goodness, knowledge; and to knowledge, self-control; and to self-control, perseverance; and to perseverance, godliness; and to godliness, brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness, love.

For if you possess these qualities in increasing measure, they will keep you from being ineffective and unproductive in your knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ.”

### 2 Peter 1:5-8

The practice of Lent has a wide and varied history. A most commonly accepted understanding connects this practice to the early church of the 4th century. Following the Council of Nicea in 325 A.D., Lent was officially declared to be a period of preparation, beginning 40 days before Easter (excluding Sundays), on what has come to be known as Ash Wednesday. In imitation of Christ's fasting for 40 days in the wilderness in preparation for his public ministry, an observance connected with penitence and sacrifice is practiced in Anglican churches. Other denominations might choose only to observe special services and practices.

While the Evangelical church has not traditionally practiced a formal observance of Lent, many have found it meaningful to incorporate aspects of it in their preparation for Easter. This year at The Village Chapel we are inviting our church family to corporately join in an observance of Lent in a unique form.

Rather than a season of denial and fasting, we are inviting you to celebrate the gifts and resources of our faith, secured for us by Christ's death and resurrection.

Theologian Louis Berkhof said that “sanctification is a work of God in which believer's cooperate.” This is clearly the aim of 2 Peter 1:5-8 which calls us to “make every effort to add to our faith” six characteristics, or Christian graces, that equip us for a flourishing and productive life as a believer. So for our practice, we will observe a theme each week in scripture reading and prayer focus. Lovely pieces of art by creatives who call TVC home, as well as excerpts from the poetry of TVC'er Julie Sumner, will accompany our practice.

We hope this will help us to be more spiritually aware of the season, and more grateful for the ongoing work of the Holy Spirit in our lives. Welcome to Lent 2020 at The Village Chapel.

**PRAY** *May the joy of doing good refresh and inform our often urgent but not important schedules.*

7 **READ** "But love your enemies, do good to them, and lend to them without expecting to get anything back. Then your reward will be great, and you will be children of the Most High, because he is kind to the ungrateful and wicked." **Luke 6:35**


**PRAY** *Oh God, give us eyes to see people as You see them, that we might do good to and for them, for the pure joy of knowing it pleases You.*

# Knowledge

The knowledge that Peter calls us to add to our faith in 1 Peter 2 is not about having a superior intellect, or academic prowess. In this context, he is referring to having a mind intent on knowing the will of God. Because we belong to God, working out our sanctification in this way is built on the foundation of that relational privilege.

Because Christ has called us "friends", as John 15:15 says, He has made known to us everything He learned from the Father. The will of God is the knowledge we seek.

# Self-Control

Matthew Henry says self-control in this passage could be seen as a “right understanding and knowledge of outward comforts.” He continues by saying that having a proper view of their worth and usefulness, allows us to see how “vastly inferior” they are to spiritual mercies.

We are also aware, from Galatians 5, that self-control is a fruit of the Spirit in our lives. In fact, our efforts at self-control are only fruitful by the empowering work of the Holy Spirit, gifted to us by Christ.

Charlie Peacock’s painting celebrates music in its great splendor. This is also a reminder that while beautiful music is grandly expressive, it also requires great self-control in the decision of what/how much/whether to play or not play each and every note of a song.

# Perseverance

While self-control is a call to wisely enjoy good things, perseverance is a call to endure bad things. Some days the glory of God seems everywhere, but other days, persevering through our own sin and the effects of sin around us will be a battle for each thought. Thankfully, Peter's imperative to "make every effort" to add perseverance to our faith is not accomplished simply by our willpower, but it is enabled by the power of the Holy Spirit.



Elizabeth's painting shows the dogged perseverance of birds in pursuit of a loose kite - while the birds fly with the wind, the kite stays in the air against the wind. Both partner with the blessing of the wind as they fly. Similarly, our perseverance is powered by the ruach - the wind - of the Holy Spirit, sometimes urging us forward, sometimes keeping us from falling.

## WEEK FOUR Perseverance

- 1 **READ** "Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us." **Hebrews 12:1**
- PRAY** *Help us let go of things that keep us from maintaining a healthy faith, moving and looking forward.*
- 2 **READ** "But the seed in the good soil, these are the ones who have heard the word in an honest and good heart, and hold it fast, and bear fruit with perseverance." **Luke 8:15**
- PRAY** *As we feed on Your good Word, Lord, give us patience that You will, in Your time, produce fruit in our lives.*
- 3 **READ** "Consider it pure joy, my brothers, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith develops perseverance. Perseverance must finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything." **James 1:2-4**
- PRAY** *Thank You for the promise that trials have ultimate purpose, and that we are not living at the whim of circumstances and random challenges.*
- 4 **READ** "And not only this, but we also exult in our tribulations, knowing that tribulation brings about perseverance; and perseverance, proven character; and proven character, hope; and hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out within our hearts through the Holy Spirit who was given to us." **Romans 5:3-5**
- PRAY** *Grant us the eyes to see the process at work in us, as You lead us through adversity to realized hope.*
- 5 **READ** "Here is the perseverance of the saints who keep the commandments of God and their faith in Jesus." **Revelation 14:12**
- PRAY** *Give us courage to obey Your design for our life, knowing that we will flourish most by living in Your ways.*
- 6 **READ** "With all prayer and petition pray at all times in the Spirit, and with this in view, be on the alert with all perseverance and petition for all the saints..." **Ephesians 6:18**
- PRAY** *Lead us in the path of perseverance, not only for our good, but the good of our brothers and sisters in Christ.*
- 7 **READ** "But if we hope for what we do not see, with perseverance we wait eagerly for it." **Romans 8:25**
- PRAY** *Strengthen us to hope in the things that are not often easily grasped, because the end result is the realization of Your promises.*

# Godliness

Theologian Joel Green describes godliness as a “practical awareness” of God. One can see that as we are present to His presence in every detail and moment of our lives, we would be urged to live in devotion to Him, or godliness.

This devotion manifests in living that is pleasing to God. Godliness is the fruit of an ongoing relationship with Him, the genesis of which is the extensive grace that has been gifted to us, to save us.



In the painting, we can see a contemplative narrative of the blood of Christ, spilled for us, so we might be given the opportunity for right relationship with God. That rich relationship with Him results in something more valuable, more beautiful than where we started, more precious than even gold.



**PRAY** *Let us remember that who we are, and what we do, should be as unto You.*
- 6 **READ** "I therefore, a prisoner for the Lord, urge you to walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which you have been called." **Ephesians 4:1**  
**PRAY** *As members of your family, help us live out our faith in the reality of our adoption into the kingdom of God.*

# Brotherly Kindness/Love



The last theme from 2 Peter 1:5-8 is love - both philadelphia (love for our brothers and sisters in Christ) and agape (a selfless love towards all). This is the culmination of Peter's concern for right belief that leads to right behavior. If love is not the resulting action of our faith, have we truly been seized by the great affection of God?

In Amanda's powerful painting, there is an imminent reminder that we live in the context of community. The chaos that could result from that would be the selfish demand for "what is mine", or "me and my needs", or "what is fair". Instead, the love of God has turned our eyes and hearts outward to the needs of others. Amanda's perfectly balanced composition in shapes and colors underpins the joyful celebration of the coterie of humanity.

- 2 **READ** "Be devoted to one another in brotherly love; give preference to one another in honor..." Romans 12:10  
**PRAY** *Help us love each other with familial affection and an attitude of willing otherness.*
- 3 **READ** "Be kind to one another, tender-hearted, forgiving each other, just as God in Christ also has forgiven you." Ephesians 4:32  
**PRAY** *We so desperately need to leave behind our bitterness Lord. Help us act in Christlike grace towards others.*
- 4 **READ** "Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs." 1 Cor. 13:4,5  
**PRAY** *Lord this list is a high standard we long to live by - may we be aware of the contrasting behavior that could so easily issue from us if we are not more consumed by your love.*
- 5 **READ** "And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity." Col. 3:14  
**PRAY** *Father help us to pursue love above being right, or first, or heard, knowing that when we pursue love together, our missional work is made effective by our unity.*
- 6 **READ** "But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you." Matthew 5:44  
**PRAY** *You modeled this so perfectly from the cross for us - loving and forgiving those who sent you there. Grow that intention of heart in us. Your image bearers, we pray.*
- 7 **READ** "He answered, 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind'; and, 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'" Luke 10:27  
**PRAY** *Oh that we could leave all other distractions and desires behind for the call of this verse - it is our heart's desire. So much else in our lives would be put in perspective by obedience to this great command.*
